



Layoffs hit former home of Keillor radio program

ST. PAUL, Minn. — Money problems have forced the World Theater, former home for Garrison Keillor's *A Prairie Home Companion*, to lay off 10 of its 12 full-time employees. Of the theater's full-time employees, only director Patrick Ruble and operations manager Ken Schumacher will remain. The World, a 76-year-old for-

mer vaudeville house, was restored as a permanent home for Keillor's radio program even though an effort to raise \$3.5 million fell short. The city helped out with a \$250,000, 12-year loan at 3 percent interest. The theater was left without a show when Keillor left St. Paul about a year after it reopened in 1986.

Court says burglar has to buy victims an alarm

MADISON, Wis. — A convicted burglar can be ordered to pay for a new burglar alarm for his victims as part of restitution, the Wisconsin Supreme Court ruled. In a 5-2 decision, justices upheld a lower court order that Louis J. Heyn pay \$4,000 for the purchase and installation of a burglar alarm. Heyn had been ordered to pay \$4,082 in
