Keillor to broadcast live from Memphis

Garrison Keillor fans are in for a double treat on Saturday.

Mr. Keillor will broadcast two new A Prairie Home Companion shows from Memphis, at 6 p.m. and 11 p.m. FDT

Xavier University's WVXU-FM (91.7) and Miami University's WMUB-FM (88.5) will carry both shows.

In a message to affiliates this week, Mr. Keillor wrote:

"Memphis is a soulful city, and I want to do a remote broadcast from an alley behind Beale Street. We want to set up our remote mikes just out the back door of a blues club and sit out there by the garbage cans... and try to capture a little of the spirit of Memphis.

"It's a blues town, and the spirit of the blues is: Bad stuff can happen to anybody anytime, and so we are all in the same boat, brother. The man in the executive suit can be brought low, the man on the park bench be raised high, so let us make our peace with each other. Anyway, that's what I think."

The Beale Street special also can be heard live online at www.prairiehome.org. Stations are not permitted to delay or repeat the special live broadcast, Mr. Keillor says.

Booting Bruce: WKRC-AM (550) moves the *Bruce Williams Show* from 7 to 10 p.m. Monday to make room for author Michael Savage (*The Savage Nation*).

The Clear Channel station added Mr. Savage, heard on 208 stations, when the future of the *Williams* show was uncertain earlier this year, says Tony Bender, program director.

Mr. Williams, who has been dropped by Westwood One, starts with a new syndication company on Monday, he says.

Mr. Savage, based in the San Francisco Bay area, has master's

degrees in medical botany and medical anthropology, and a doctorate degree in epidemiology and nutrition science. He has written 18 books.
