She got him in a cab down to O'Ney's at Rahn and Far Hills, where all went well until about 5:30 p.m., when Roth got a call from Keillor: "I think I went the wrong way. I'm at Whipp and (Ohio) 48." Indeed he had, and he didn't have a cell phone. Keiller was calling from a pay phone and was down to his last quarter, and Roth almost missed the call. Meanwhile, there were 400 people in the store waiting to see their prairie home companion. Keillor turned down a ride, saving he'd hoof it. Roth nervously waited on Far Hills near l'Auberge to keep an eye out for him ("I didn't want him to pass us by") and fi-
