Garrison Keillor is bringing his live radio broadcast of humorous skits, fictitious sponsors, his sig-nature monologue and the News from Lake Wobegon to Jackson's Thalia Mara Hall.

Traina Mara Hail. Tickets for A Prairie Home Companion's live broadcast from Jackson are sold out, but the live national broadcast can be heard, as it is each Saturday, on Public Radio in Mississippi from 5 to 7 nm p.m.


